#### 5. Reports

#### A. Brockton Area Regional Transit Authority (BAT)

Michael Lambert reported on the following items:

- Ridership was down slightly in February, which is typical. Overall, for the year to date ridership is up over last year and about seventy-five per cent of pre-quarantine ridership levels.
- Brockton Area Transit is actively monitoring the development of the new state budget. Governor
  Healey's draft budget includes an approximately 8% increase in funding to Regional transit
  Authorities and opportunities for applying for additional discretionary grants.
- Brockton Area Transit is preparing to apply for low and no emission grant which will help fund the Authority's conversion to an electric fleet.
- Brockton Area Transit is working closely with Signature Healthcare Brockton Hospital and other medical services providers following the closing of Signature Healthcare Brockton Hospital.

#### B. Greater Attleboro-Taunton Regional Transit Authority (GATRA)

Shawn Bailey reported on the following items:

- GATRA has announced service changes on seven routes, going into effect on March 6, 2023.
- GATRA is hosting a VOVID-19 Vaccination Clinic at the Attleborough train station on March 10, 2023 from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM

#### C. South Coast Rail Project

Shawn Bailey reported on the following:

The South Coast Rail (SCR) project will restore commuter rail service between Boston and southeastern Massachusetts by the end of 2023. Taunton, Fall River, and New Bedford are the only major cities within 50 miles of Boston that do not currently have commuter rail service to Boston. SCR will reconnect this region to jobs and generate economic development.

South Coast Rail consists of two phases:

Phase 1 will provide a one-seat ride by extending the existing Middleborough/Lakeville commuter rail line from Boston to Taunton, Fall River, and New Bedford and it will deliver service to the South Coast by late 2023.

Full Build plans to extend Commuter Rail service to continue travel on the Stoughton branch of the Providence/Stoughton line, connecting to more communities in the region. Doing so would result in reconstructing the Canton Center and Stoughton stations to accommodate two rail lines.

In February 2023, work conducted involved fencing installation in eight communities on Fall River & Middleborough Secondary Lines and New Bedford Main Line; utilizing Cotley Street in Berkley to access right-of-way (ROW) for various project activities; daytime shoulder and lane closure on Route 140 Southbound in Taunton for curb and sidewalk installation; daytime track work in Berkley; daytime signal work in Berkley; water main work at the Samuel Barnet Boulevard crossing in New Bedford; daytime roadwork on Route 105 in Middleborough; and signal system installation and testing in seven communities on the Fall River & Middleborough Secondary and New Bedford Main Lines.

Additional work done included daytime construction at station sites, layover sites, and along the right-of-way from Middleborough to New Bedford as well as along the right-of-way from Berkley to Fall River. There was also overnight and daytime transportation of soils by truck to designated project sites as well as detours for various project activities.

#### 6. Old Business

#### A. FFY 2023-2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Implementation

Update on TIP Amendment 1

Bill McNulty provided the following update on the implementation on the implementation of the FFY 2023-2027 TIP, reporting that TIP Amendment 1 had been endorsed by the Old Colony MPO on February 21, 2023. TIP Amendment 1 programmed four MassDOT Community Transit Grant Program awards into the TIP.

Bill McNulty noted that project costs have increased for Project 607403 (Route 138 Corridor Improvement, Stoughton) and 608279 (Intersection Improvements at Central Street (Route 27), Canton

Street, and Tosca Drive, Stoughton) and that future MPO action to amend the TIP may be needed to accommodate these cost increases.

#### 7. New Business

#### A. Development of FFY 2024-2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Bill McNulty reported on the results of TIP Readiness Day, an annual project status review of projects currently programmed in the existing FFY 2023-2027 TIP and review of projects that could potentially be programmed in the FFY 2024-2028 TIP.

Bill McNulty reported as a result of TIP Readiness Day, Project 608506 (Corridor Improvements on Maquan Street (Route 14), Hanson), currently programmed for Advance Construction in FFY 2026 and FFY 2027, is recommended now for FFY 2027 and FFY 2028 due to concerns that utility issues may not be resolved in time for FFY 2026. The recommendation for Project 606143 (Crescent Street (Route 27) at Quincy Street and Massasoit Boulevard, Brockton) was to deprogram due to lack of activity on this project. All other existing programmed projects appeared to be on track for their current years of programming.

#### B. Old Colony MPO Measure of Effectiveness Report

Presentation and Report Summary

Shawn Baily provided a presentation on the Old Colony MPO Measure of Effectiveness Report.

Public Participation is a key ingredient in the Old Colony Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) transportation planning efforts. Public Participation not only leads to better projects, studies, and outcomes, but also helps spend limited funding in a manner in line with community and regional goals. In addition to helping develop better projects, public outreach fosters greater trust between citizens and Local, State, and the Federal Government and their representative entities like the Old Colony MPO. Lastly, the MPO is required by State and Federal partners to ensure it is including members of the public in the transportation planning process.

In order ensure the Old Colony MPO is meeting its public participation requirements, measures are necessary to determine whether its Public Participation Plan (PPP) is accomplishing its goals. Through a series of data collection efforts that take place during outreach efforts, the MPO obtains the ability to see where the PPP is succeeding and where there are opportunities for greater participation. This report explores outreach efforts and measures their effectiveness in expanding public participation to members of the public and outside organizations in MPO planning activities.

In order to better understand how the MPO is meeting its commitment to fostering public engagement in all MPO planning activities, it is key to develop a series of measurements to understand the effectiveness of the public outreach efforts. It is through the tracking of public engagements, whether it be in person, via email, through social media or utilizing virtual public engagement, that the MPO can determine if its public outreach efforts are delivering the results that are desired and required.

The Old Colony MPO tracks all the outreach efforts it conducts. Public meeting attendance is recorded with additional attention given to attendees that are from Title VI protected classes. The MPO tracks the methods it employs in getting information to the public on upcoming meetings, the release of public documents, and the viewing and engagement of the public through its social media presence. Through the collection of this information the MPO gains greater clarity on where it is doing well and where there is a need to increase public engagement.

#### C. Old Colony 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan – Development Update

Bill McNulty provided an update on the development of the Old Colony Vision 2050 Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP).

Old Colony Planning Council will host an information session virtually via Zoom on March 21, 2023 at 6:00 PM. During this information session, Staff will present an overview of the Vision 20250 Long Range Transportation Plan and discuss the contents of each section (Goals and Objectives, Performance Targets and Measurement, Planning Scenarios, Regional Profile, Highway, Transit, Vulnerable Users, Safety and Security), and welcome guests to ask questions and provide input on their transportation priorities over the life of the Plan.

Collaboration with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation, Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC), and UMASS Donahue Institute continuous, reviewing and socioeconomic (population, households, and employment) estimates for 2030, 2040, and 2050. A final set of figures is anticipated this Spring.

Stakeholder engagement is currently underway. Meetings with stakeholders are being scheduled to discuss their needs and solicit their input into the process. A series of or public engagement events (webinars, open houses, information tables) are also being planned and scheduled.

Old Colony Planning Council is currently performing a pavement conditions assessment of the federalaid eligible roadway network in the Old Colony region. This assessment will be used in developing investment scenarios and an overall investment figure needed to improve and maintain the entire system in a state of good repair.

The Draft 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan will be released for public review and comment later this Spring.

#### 8. Other Business and Public Comment

#### A. Community Local Technical Assistance Studies

Bill McNulty provided an update of project statuses being prepared through the Old Colony MPO's Local Highway Technical Assistance Program.

#### EEA #16665 - East Bridgewater-Brockton Sewer Extension Project

The proposed sewer extension project includes construction of several thousand feet of gravity and force main pipe and one wastewater pumping station to service a limited area sewer district in the Town of East Bridgewater. Wastewater flows collected at the proposed pump station will be pumped from East Bridgewater across the municipal boundary into the City of Brockton before discharging into Brockton's existing sewer infrastructure. The project triggers MEPA review thresholds for a wastewater service across a municipal boundary and temporary impacts of more than 5,000 square feet of bordering vegetated wetlands.

#### **FEIR Rollover**

#### EEA #16636 - Ellis Brett Pond Dam Repairs - Brockton

# **Summary**

he development of the FFY 2024-2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is underway. The TIP serves as a prioritized listing of highway, bridge, and transit projects for implementation that reflect the needs of the regional transportation system. The TIP is fiscally constrained based on expected federal funding, and it contains projects that are consistent with the Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP).

At their meeting on March 21, 2023, the Old Colony MPO reviewed and considered three scenarios for the Draft FFY 2024-2028 TIP. After review and discussion, the MPO selected Scenario 2 as the Preferred Set of Projects. Staff will now prepare the Draft FFY 2024-2028 TIP, which the MPO, at their April 18, 2023 meeting, will potentially review and release to a public review and comment period. At their May 16, 2023 meeting, the MPO will hear public comments, consider any revisions, and then potentially endorse the FFY 2024-2028 TIP

Old Colony Planning Council will next host an information table at Bridgewater State University's Earth Day Celebration on April 21, 2023

Collaboration with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation, Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC), and UMASS Donahue Institute continuous, reviewing, and socioeconomic (population, households, and employment) estimates for 2030, 2040, and 2050. A final set of figures is anticipated very soon.

Stakeholder engagement is currently underway. Meetings with stakeholders are being scheduled to discuss their needs and solicit their input into the process. A series of or public engagement events (webinars, open houses, information tables) are also being planned and scheduled.

Old Colony Planning Council is currently performing a pavement conditions assessment of the federal-aid eligible roadway network in the Old Colony region. ### **New Projects**

**Environmental Status and Planning Report (ESPR)** 

#### EEA #11202 – MassDOT Snow and Ice Control

- The following represents some of the changes from the completion of the 2017 ESPR:
- MassDOT now uses over 75 liquid-intensive slurry-spreaders statewide, which are highly effective in preventing hardpack from forming on the pavement and keeping snow in a more plowable form during prolonged winter events.
- MassDOT has added over 25 vehicle mounted mobile Road Weather Information System (RWIS) sensors to supplement the over 45 fixed stations across the state.
- Calibration contractors are now required to add visible markings on the rear of the spreader vehicles to indicate the gate opening at the time of calibration, which allows visual inspections of gate opening during the winter season.
- In the last 5 years, MassDOT has reduced its average annual statewide salt usage from 26.9 to 23.0 tons per lane-mile, which approximately 30% less than the 33.4 tons per

lane-mile used on an average annual basis between FY01 and FY 10 under similar winter weather severity conditions.

### **EEA #16561 – Raynham Park Redevelopment**

The United States Environmental Protection Agency intends to issue the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit MAG640000 for discharge from Potable Water Treatment Facilities (i.e., the Potable Water Treatment Facility General Permit or PWTF GP) to eligible PWTFs in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the State of New Hampshire. The PWTF GP authorizes the discharge of drinking water residuals from up

to 77 eligible potable water treatment facilities in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the State of New Hampshire (i.e., 71 in Massachusetts and up to 6 in New Hampshire). Of the 71 Massachusetts facilities eligible for potential coverage under the PWTF GP, one facility discharges to the coastal zone.
