

In addition, I wish to thank all of the members of Committees of the Council for their active participation and involvement. The OCPC staff also deserves recognition for their high level of dedication and performance during the year. Finally, I would like to thank all of the individuals who actively participated and supported the work of the Council over the past year and who are not listed in this report. To each of them I extend my sincere thanks on behalf of the organization for a job well.

#### COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

This year the Council has been working on growth management at the regional, multi-community and local scales. This is crucial given the region's continuing rapid growth and the increases which are following transportation improvements.

The Vision 20/20 Project for Southeastern Massachusetts is providing a framework to guide the future development of the region. Its purpose is to develop a broad-based consensus on growth related needs, opportunities, and goals; to communicate its findings to the greater community, and to and adopt an overall action program. The effort involves a 50 person task force drawing on the business, academia, government, real estate, banking and the environmental communities. It is led by land use attorney Don Connors and staffed by the Old Colony Planning Council (OCPC), the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC), the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD) and consultants. It is expected that the work of the Vision 20/20 Task Force will conclude shortly after the start of the new calendar year with a series of recommendations for growth management.

The Regional Policy Plan is the Council's major planning effort this year. The purpose is to develop regionally consistent policies for use by all levels of government and the private sector in future development related decision making and investment. It will replace the currently dated Regional Plan with a greater emphasis on overall policies than on specific land use recommendations. The effort is in cooperation with a broadly based regional advisory committee. The Committee has adopted a draft statement of Goals and Objectives. These reflected continuing concerns of the original plan, other issues of rapid growth within the Council's jurisdiction, and recent influences such as commuter rail restoration and highway improvements. The effort includes initial steps toward updating regional land use information, calculating potential buildout on a community basis, projecting population, employment and land/water consumption given present trends, and identifying more compact, varied traditional town development patterns which better suit the region's goals and objectives. The project is funded by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Environmental Affairs and the Massachusetts Highway Department.

The Communities at Risk Project initiated this year is a related, more locally-focused effort identifying potential impacts and opportunities in the immediate vicinity of transportation improvements, especially commuter rail station stations, and then exploring appropriate development patterns and related regulatory methods. It is being done in cooperation with (MAPC) and (SERPEDD) and covers an arc of communities from Norwell to Lakeville. Council staff are exploring opportunities near the Kingston rail station while sharing ideas and findings with MAPC and SERPEDD staff studying the Scituate (Greenbush) and Middleboro/Lakeville station areas, respectively. The project is funded by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Environmental Affairs and the Massachusetts Highway Department.

The Transportation-Induced Growth Study is examining the effects of transportation improvements on Kingston, Plymouth and Plympton through a contract with the firm of Parsons Brinckerhoff

Quade and Douglas. The purpose is to anticipate, predict and respond to transportation-induced growth impacts in these communities. Key tasks are analyzing the maximum growth possible in each community and developing a model relating changed migration and growth patterns to increased accessibility from various points. The effort is overseen by a committee of local officials and the Council, and funded by the Massachusetts Highway Department.

Completed work on the Abington Master Plan and the related Opens Space/Recreation Plan includes a review of past studies, a land use inventory and buildout anlysis, and draft sections on the circulation, water and sewer systems. Staff are examining ways to balance expected residential growth with an increased non-residential tax base while preserving the town's amenities and character.

On the Avon Master Plan the Council has completed the review of past studies, the vacant land inventory and buildout analysis, and draft sections on housing, community facilities and circulation. Most recently staff have participated in a series of Planning Board workshops on community issues and needs. The workshops have involved Planning Board members, the Moderator, other town official and department heads, and interested citizens and land owners.

Work on the Halifax Master Plan is farthest along. Completed items include the review of past studies detailed small-area land use mapping and buildout analysis, draft goals and objectives, sections on housing, community facilities, commercial/industrial development, and the impacts of rail and retail improvement. The major recent product is a discussion of development regulations and recommendations including enhanced water resource protection and two approaches to cluster development.

#### Other activities:

- Support to Open Space planning efforts in Plympton and Halifax
- \* Assisting East Bridgewater in applying for state dam repair funds.
- \* Participation on the South Shore Local Governance Committee of the Massachusetts Bay Program developing activities to improve water quality.
- \* Assisting Brockton in exploring opportunities for open space/recreation opportunities along the Salisbury Brook and related historical /cultural activities.
- \* Close support to the town of Abington regarding South Weymouth Naval Air Station reuse planning including participation on the project's Technical Advisory Committee and preparation of the related Route 18 Corridor Study.
- Initial exploratory work on land use and circulation issues in the Easton/Brockton /West Bridgewater Coweeset Brook Business Area.
- Participation in citizen education activities of the Hanson Master Planning effort
- \* Participation on the Pilgrim Area Resource Conservation and Development Area Council planning natural resource, agricultural and community development projects
- Closely monitoring the proposed Pine Hill's development in Pl;ymouth including participation in the MEPA review process.
- \* Participation on Congressman Delahunt's committee regarding a coastal bluff erosion threatening Plymouth's Nameloc Heights neighborhood.

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Council's Economic Development Program is concerned with helping existing firms to remain or expand within the region, attracting new economic activities which fit the region's resources and labor force, strengthening key resources, including activities to improve the region's water, sewer and transportation systems, and supporting manpower training. This effort is supported by the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) which has designated the Council region an Economic Development District.

The past year's efforts have included:

- Prepared the Overall Economic Development Program Report (OEDP). The report analyzes
   District trends, resources and needs, reports on progress, and lists high priority projects for
   potential EDA assistance.
- Hosted bi-monthly meetings of the OEDP Committee. The Committee's basic activities include reviewing industrial finance bonds issued to businesses in the OCPC region by the Massachusetts Development Finance Agency. This year two bonds were approved, a \$665,000 bond for Thorsen, Inc. of Avon, MA, a precision metal fabricator and laser job shop to purchase new equipment a \$6,500,000 bond for Barbour Corporation, a shoe products and plastics manufacturer in Brockton to build a new plant and buy new machinery. Other activities include reviewing progress and annually revising the goals and objectives in the OEDP Report, updating the Report's high priority project list and initiating/overseeing special projects. More broadly, the Committee serves as an idea and information exchange for agencies, firms, officials and individuals concerned with economic development in the District.
- Implemented a Minority Business Enterprise Program, funded by the EDA. A Minority Business Development Specialist (MBDS) was hired by the Council. The MBDS provided technical assistance to 59 minority businesses in Brockton and compiled a complete list of minority-owned businesses in Brockton. OCPC co-sponsored a Minority Business networking dinner and several minority/woman owned business information forums.
- Completed the Plymouth Area Aquaculture Feasibility Study with a final report on pre-permitting of intertidal aquaculture sites and the possibility of enhancing the value of the dogfish catch with dockside cleaning and cooling facilities. It found that extensive restricted areas limited the benefits of pre-permitting, and that on-boat cooling was more important since dogfish were adequately cooled at the dock while an adequate cleaning/processing facility would require much space but only be useful seasonally.
- Served on the Joint Staff Committee of the South Weymouth Naval Air Station Planning Committee. The three towns involved (Abington, Rockland and South Weymouth) approved at Town Meetings held in Spring 1998 to approve a mixed (commercial, residential, industrial, recreation and open space) reuse plan and the creation of the South Shore Tri-Town Redevelopment Corporation, which will buy the base from the U.S. Navy and develop it.
- Continued to provide data, program information and other assistance to a wide variety of private firms and public agencies interested in the region.

#### TRANSPORTATION

This year, the Council's major transportation planning efforts were focused on initiating three major studies: the Kingston, Plymouth and Plympton Transportation Induce Growth impact Study; the Brockton Central Area Traffic (BCAT) Study; and, the Regional Comprehensive Land use/Transportation Policy Plan. The Council also continued its work with the regional transportation demand model, management system and public participation programs.

The Council relies upon the Joint Transportation Committee (JTC) for input and direction on matters pertaining to transportation. The JTC Committee also advises the region's Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) whose members are the Executive Office of Transportation and Construction (EOTC), Massachusetts Highway Department (MHD), Brockton Area Transit Authority (BAT), and the Old Colony Planning Council. The principal function of the JTC Committee is to facilitate and enhance the public participation element of the transportation planning process. Under the Fiscal Year 1997/1998 Unified Work Program the Council conducted a variety of activities drawing on the JTC for advice and guidance. These included:

- OCPC initiate work the Regional Comprehensive Land use/Transportation Policy Plan.
- The Council awarded a contract to Rizzo Associates, Inc. to conduct the Brockton Central Area Traffic (BCAT) Study.
- OCPC also awarded a contract to Parsons Brinckerhoff Quade and Douglas, Inc. to conduct the Kingston, Plymouth and Plympton Transportation Induce Growth Impact Study.
- Completed the 1998 Air Quality Addendum to the 1997 Long Range Regional Transportation Plan.
- Continued to support and implement the Public Participation Plan developed and adopted by OCPC in 1994, as required by federal planning regulations.
- Completed the 1997 Regional Pavement Management Report Evaluation of Pavement Conditions and Maintenance requirements for Federal-Aid Eligible Surface transportation Projects.
- Completed the 1997 Congestion Management Report
- Staff continued work on the Pavement and Congestion Management Systems.
  - Continued to monitor ridership and parking utilization on the Old Colony Commuter Rail Service.
  - Developed the 1998-1999 Unified Work Program (UWP) for the OCPC region which describes all work to be accomplished by the Old Colony MPO.
- Developed and endorsed the FY 1998 2003 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- Developed the final draft FY 1999 2004 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- Conducted a ridership analysis for the Brockton Area Transit Authority (BAT).
- Provided transit technical assistance to BAT and GATRA.
- The transportation staff completed work on the Brockton Downtown Intermodal Facility Study.
- Collected and maintained regional traffic counts, accident data, and other related statistics for Transportation Planning studies for member communities.

#### ABOUT OLD COLONY PLANNING COUNCIL

The Old Colony Planning Council (OCPC) is a comprehensive regional planning organization established under state statute in 1967 to "prepare plans for the physical, social and economic development of the District." The Council was formed in response to a growing need of local communities to be able to address problems that cross over local boundaries such as air and water pollution, transportation deficiencies and economic distress. These types of problems require cooperative action by affected local governments and OCPC is the governmental mechanism available at the local level to effect municipal cooperation and coordination.

OCPC is one of thirteen regional planning agencies in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and serves as the Metropolitan Planning Organization for transportation and transit planning; is designated as an Economic Development District by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration; and is the Area Agency on Aging which administers and plans for elder service needs and requirements in a twenty-three community area of Southeastern Massachusetts. The Council is also the designated Regional Clearinghouse for the review of federal and state program applications.

The Old Colony Planning Council is administered by representatives of its fifteen member communities. The Council members establish policy, develop the program, employ the professional staff and determine the activities of the Council to be carried out by the staff.
