



Community One Stop For Growth

- A streamlined application portal that allows municipalities to apply for multiple community development grants through a single application. (12 Programs)
- Designed to allow applicants to apply for consideration of multiple sources of funding to support multiple phases and facets of a project.

MassWorks Infrastructure Program

- Provides capital funds to municipalities and public entities for public infrastructure projects that support housing production, spur private development, and create jobs.
- It emphasizes multi-family housing in walkable, mixed-use districts and aims to boost economic development in distressed areas.

Massachusetts Downtown Initiative

- Focuses on revitalizing downtown areas by providing TA & funding to municipalities for projects that enhance economic vitality, community involvement & downtown character.
- It aims to create vibrant, healthy, and prosperous downtowns and make downtown




Rural Development Fund

- Supports projects that address the unique economic needs and challenges faced by smaller communities, which often struggle to compete with larger cities for grant resources.
- ✓ Provides grants for capital and community planning projects in rural and small towns towns with populations less than 7,000 or with a population density of less than 500 persons per square mile (2020 US Census).

Community Planning Grant Program

Provides funding for technical assistance for Community Planning projects that support sustainable and equitable growth by helping communities plan for future needs and challenges.

Underutilized Properties Program

- Funds capital improvement and code compliance projects to improve, rehabilitate, or redevelop blighted, abandoned, vacant, or underutilized properties.
- Its goals include eliminating blight, increasing housing production, supporting economic development, and making commercial buildings more accessible

Site Readiness Program

- Aims to increase the state's inventory of large, well-located, project-ready sites to accelerate private-sector investment in industrial, commercial, and mixed-use projects.
- Supports the conversion of abandoned sites and obsolete facilities into clean, actively used, tax-generating properties

Brownfields Redevelopment Program

- Provides financing for the environmental assessment and remediation of brownfield sites, which are often vacant or underused properties contaminated by pollutants.
- This program aims to revitalize these sites, improving public health, the environment, and local economies with technical assistance to help navigate the complexities of brownfield redevelopment.

Real Estate Services Technical **Assistance Grant**

- Provides expert guidance and resources for planning and development projects tied to the redevelopment of public surplus property or to the adoption of district management tools.
- This program helps communities address site-specific and district-wide economic development challenges through a combination of in-house expertise and third-party consultants.

Housing Choice

- Provides incentives, rewards, technical assistance & targeted legislative reform to encourage municipalities to plan & build a diverse housing stock.
- Rewards municipalities that have produced significant # of housing units.

Housing Works

- Funds infrastructure projects to support and unlock housing opportunities.

Urban Agenda

Funds community-driven projects aimed at addressing locally defined economic opportunities. It focuses on building leadership, collaboration, and capacity within urban communities to foster economic vitality and stronger neighborhoods.

No Funding Cap
Awards range from \$300,000 to \$5 million with an average award of \$2.5 million.



Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance Program

- Provides funding to help distressed communities revitalize, expand, and upgrade their physical infrastructure to support long-term economic development.
- Offers flexible assistance for regions experiencing sudden or long-term economic changes, such as those caused by natural disasters or major industry shifts.

Business Development ProgramsMass Growth Capital Corporation (MGCC)



Biz-M-Power Crowdfunding Program: Helps small businesses with financial assistance for acquisition, expansion, improvement, or lease of a facility, purchase or lease of equipment, or other capital needs.

<u>Up to \$20,000.</u> **Requires a 1:1 match.

CDFI & CDC Capital Match Program: By providing a new source of matching funds, program seeks to spur job creation, support entrepreneurship and small business recovery, sustainability, resilience and growth by lowering the barriers to capital access faced by small businesses.

<u>Up to \$200,000.</u> **Requires a 50% match.

Small Business Technical Assistance Grant Programs: Builds operational capacity and skills of organizations that are providing technical assistance, education, and access to capital to small businesses. The program strengthens ongoing business-development activities in low-and moderate-income and underserved communities

<u>Up to \$100,000.</u> **No match.

Awarded to community development corporations, chambers of commerce, and similar non-profits.



Business Development ProgramsSmall Business Administration (SBA)



- Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) Program: This highly competitive program encourages small businesses to engage in federal research and development with the potential for commercialization.
- Small Business Technology Transfer (STTR) Program: This program expands funding opportunities in the federal innovation research and development arena by fostering public/private sector partnerships between small businesses and nonprofit research institutions.
- State Trade Expansion Program (STEP): Provides financial awards to state and territory governments to help small businesses with export development.

Massachusetts Vacant Storefronts Program (MVSP): Helps municipalities revitalize their downtowns and commercial areas by designating Certified Vacant Storefront Districts.
Businesses or individuals leasing/occupying a vacant storefront can apply for refundable EDIP tax credits.

Up to \$10,000 in refundable tax credits.

Regional Economic Development Organization Grant Program (REDO): Supports organizations that promote regional economic growth by providing funding for projects that enhance business development and job creation.

Organizations can receive grants to implement initiatives that align with the state's economic development goals, fostering collaboration and innovation within their regions.










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
